

Sports Premium Grant expenditure Livingstone Road Infant School

The Government is providing funding of £150 million per annum to improve the physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. This funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport in schools. Funding for schools in the past has been calculated at approximately £8000 and reference to the number of primary-aged pupils (between the ages of 5 and 11), as recorded in the annual schools census in January 2013. This year the Government has pledged to double the funding.

At Livingstone Road Infant School, this has provided additional funding as follows;

Purpose of funding

All young people should have the opportunity to live healthy and active lives. A positive experience of sport and physical activity at a young age can build a lifetime habit of participation, and is central to meeting the government's ambitions for a world-class education system.

Physical activity has numerous benefits for children and young people's physical health, as well as their mental wellbeing (increasing self-esteem and emotional wellbeing and lowering anxiety and depression), and children who are physically active are happier, more resilient and more trusting of their peers. Ensuring that pupils have access to sufficient daily activity can also have wider benefits for pupils and schools, improving behaviour as well as enhancing academic achievement.

The PE and Sport Premium is given to schools so that they can make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, physical activity and sport offered through their core budgets. It is allocated directly to schools so they have the flexibility to use it in the way that works best for their pupils. The PE and Sport Premium survey highlighted the significant impact which PE and Sport has had in many primary schools across England.

- *To enable greater amounts of intra school sport to occur – increase competitive sport*
- *To monitor and offer CPD for a curriculum that builds on knowledge and skills from EYFS to Year 6*
